- Bullington is one of Orbit USA's "four new stars of fantasy fiction"

- Set in Nigeria and the US, this dark comedy about disaster capitalism, cut-throat office politics, vicious sibling rivalry, and the corporatization of water immediately brings to mind the works of Douglas Coupland, Naomi Klein as well as John Kennedy Toole's *A Confederacy of Dunces*
- Currently based in the UK, Carole Enahoro has lived and worked all over the globe—as a producer in film and television and a lecturer in art history, filmmaking and writing—and is from a family of Nigerian diplomats

- Three previous novels optioned to major US filmmakers—*Gil's All Fright Diner* (Jim Henson/New Line Cinema), *In the Company of Ogres* (Rough Draft Studios), and *The Automatic Detective* to director David Fincher (*Fight Club*; *Panic Room*) and Tim Miller (Academy Award nominated Blur Studios)
- With *Monster*, Martinez has moved to Orbit USA in a two-book deal
- With Martinez's trademark humour on display, *Monster* is the boisterous story of Monster and Judy, two humans who don't like each other much but together, in suburban USA, must fight dragons, fire-breathing felines, trolls, Inuit walrus dogs, and a crazy cat lady for the future of the universe

- Sold in an aggressive pre-emptive bid to Penguin Group (Canada), to Weidenfeld & Nicolson (UK) and at auction to HarperCollins (US)—to be simultaneously published as a lead fiction title by all three houses
- A tale of fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, sisters, and brothers whose desperate hands till the earth, while equally desperate minds plot much darker deeds
- Rich in emotion and anticipation, this sublimely crafted and deceptively simple first novel has already been endorsed by internationally acclaimed authors such as Joseph Boyden (*Through Black Spruce*), Stephen Galloway (*The Cellist of Sarajevo*) and Janice Kulyk Keefer (*The Ladies' Lending Library*)
